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Guest Editorial: Farewell from Trent's eighth president

On July 1, I begin my life post-presidency. As I near the next chapter of my and Trent's stories, I am thinking about my last decade and the promises of life-after-presidency. I am struck by the need to thank so many people who have supported Trent during my two terms of office.

Many have asked me what it's like to be a Trent President. My personal experience has been regulated by a never-ending chain of e-mails. I am a night owl who works late, reading and answering the e-mails in my inbox. They come with many different messages, relaying the sender's secret stories about the history of Trent; personal advice for me or others; what Trent should do (or purchase); political speculation on what is happening in the provincial government; questions of every sort imaginable; and constant requests for assistance.

In my experience, the latter can be satisfying: it feels good to help someone in need when you are able to do so. The e-mails are still, but less enjoyable, when there is controversy in the air. And controversy and universities are common siblings. Sometimes, my e-mail box seemed like the beast Hydra in ancient mythology – a serpent with many heads that grew more whenever one of them was dispatched.

When we decided to cancel our in-person convocation during COVID, I received four

hundred e-mails from graduating students demanding that we reverse our decision. I responded to everyone, sometimes more than once. When we were forced to close our campuses in view of the pandemic - and when we finally reopened them - I was inundated with furious e-mails written in capital letters that told me "YOU ARE PERSONALLY RESPONSIBLE FOR MY HEALTH."

I won't miss every e-mail exchange when July 1 comes around, but it will be strange to get up in the morning and not be greeted by a daily deluge of incoming mail. I suspect that I will be pleased to forward what I do receive to our incoming President, Dr. Cathy Bruce (thank you Cathy!).

Not every day as President is a good one, but the moments of satisfaction greatly outweigh the moments of frustration. Especially as I have worked with a great team and our trajectory has been relentlessly positive. With that in mind, I want to THANK ALL OF YOU READING THIS FAREWELL (and especially Tony Storey) for your support and patience during my time as President.

I will step away from my role thinking of Trent as a community. The heart of our community is our academic enterprises: teaching and research, students and professors. But it extends further, to past and future students, to retired staff and faculty, to Board members, and to all the people we work with in our communities (locally, provincially, nationally, internationally). The tentacles of Trent touch everyone affected by what we do: by reading a Trent author, listening to Trent Elders, attending Trent events, or working with Trent scientists and staff (present or retired).

My principal thought today is that I will remain a member of the Trent community on and after July 1st. I plan to be a more relaxed member of our community, one who spends more time kayaking and writing (on philosophy and my Trent experiences), but I will remain a member nonetheless. Eventually I hope to make it back to the classroom and be a part of Trent in yet another way.

As an ex-President, I look forward to spending more time with TUARP in the future (with a special interest in events at the Pig's Ear or the Canoe and Paddle!).

Remembrances of Colleagues Past

Professor John Burbidge

John Burbidge died in Peterborough on November 2, 2023. (Obituary here.)

I had the privilege of serving on a review of the Colleges during my time at Otonabee College. John was an ideal chairperson: calm, intelligent and measured in his approach. He and his wife Barbara hosted a lovely dinner for our committee when we had completed our work.

I also recall their garage sale at the Champlain College Master's Lodge when John was concluding his term. Somehow I came away with a set of novels by Alexandre Dumas.

Former president John Stubbs recalled him as a committed and responsible Trent citizen. President Leo Groarke commented that when he became President, he and John got together every summer until COVID hit. He was an important Canadian philosopher, known for his work on Hegel. Leo noted that at the same time, he was a remarkable source of knowledge on the history of Trent, and a very capable administrator with all the instincts that make someone an excellent administrator.

Peter Lewis remembered John as a quiet somewhat old fashioned man who with Barbara bought the Lewis home on Homewood Avenue. In John's retirement, he repaired and re-bound at least one of Peter's books.

Margaret Doxey

Professor Dale Standen was kind enough to let me know that Professor Emeritus Margaret Doxey had died, just as we were approaching our editorial deadline. Until the past few years, she was a regular supporter of TUARP activities and I recall her especial pleasure when we hosted the Christmas Reception at her beloved Lady Eaton College. However, the trumpet and piano music played havoc with her hearing aid! (Obituary here.)

Jim English

I met Jim English early in my new role as Alumni Coordinator in 1974. He served as Trent's Director of Information Services and as Editor of what was then known as Alumnus magazine.

What you read in TUARP Times is a direct legacy of his influence on me and university publications. It was so beneficial to my career to have the benefit of his experience and sage counsel.

Early in my retirement I held a volunteer role at the Bata Library with the Trent Archives. I helped process collections to develop finding aids for people who wished to view the collection. I was given several boxes of materials from Jim's era at Information Services. Going through this material was akin to walking back in time... before fax machines, email, digital files and the Internet.

Jim conducted much of his work through correspondence and the telephone. And he did it with grace and humour. Trent was very fortunate to have had him as an early leader.

Sign Up With Volunteer Peterborough

As you face a less full work schedule, have you decided what to do with your time? After all, you have a lot of skills, talents and wisdom to share. Where will you invest it?

If you're struggling to envision where you might go, VolunteerPeterborough.ca can help. It identifies causes that interest you, then filters your skills to match groups looking for those gifts. Next, you see a job description to see if it's right for you.

When Volunteer Peterborough met with focus groups earlier last year, prospective volunteers said they encountered multiple barriers to getting involved. Primarily:

- No one "asked."
- Lack of a central database and insufficient promotion.
- No defined roles with specific timelines or projects with end dates.

VolunteerPeterborough.ca took that information and designed a site that highlights



current opportunities, including short-, mediumand long-term commitments. That way, you can quickly shop around for a new role or an additional one.

The free website invites people to sign up as individuals or to register organizations. Once a non-profit passes a legitimacy screening, you can post roles and events, which get promoted via newsletters, social media posts, etc.

At this point, the group has signed up 850 volunteers and 101 organizations; those numbers grow every week. And this movement is just getting started.

How can you help?

- Volunteer and invite others along. Make volunteering contagious.
- Sign up a non-profit and post jobs to make even more matches.

It's really that easy.


