### O-T-O. O-T-O. NABEE: The 50th Annivesary of Otonabee College

We began Saturday May 13 being greeted with a souvenir bag of goodies in the Wenjack Theatre foyer. OC retirees, alumni, students, faculty and staff converged with participants from a parallel event for the Classes of 1967 through 1970. I soon spotted TUARP stalwarts David Morrison and Alena Heitlinger. We would share parts of the overall day's itinerary, while also enjoying distinct activities.

The opening plenary session was moderated

by Chancellor Stephen Stohn and featured three Then and Now presentations. Professor Gordon Johnston took us back to the early 70s when the Canadian literary scene was bursting into bloom. Trent was well positioned through its college system to welcome Canadian poets and writers and others who were warmly embraced. It was interesting to hear the poet AJM Smith referred to as Arthur and to see photos of him along with WO Mitchell, Al Purdy, Margaret Laurence and

others.

Deborah Berrill was our tour guide for the beginnings of the Teacher Education program and later, the School of Education. She compellingly demonstrated the meteoric growth of the initial Concurrent Education partnership with Queen's University and then the development of a Trent School of Education. We also learned of her current passionate involvement in the Trent World University Services Canada Student Refugee Program.

The third speaker was alumnus Dan Longboat who connected the dots beginning with the founding of Indian and Eskimo Studies to today's Enweying First Peoples House of Learning.

One interesting thread that surfaced during all of the speakers' remarks, including the Chancellor, was how at some point, and in some way, Tom Symons played a role in all of the areas being showcased.

Following the plenary there was an opportunity for a refreshment break. The Otonabee

There was an enthusiastic distribution of college scarves and a summary of the Heads of College and their contributions to the development of Otonabee through the years. Although he was away due to travel, Professor Ian Storey had put together this welcome summary beginning with Robert Carter. There was a particularly moving video clip of the late Bob Annett talking about the importance of Otonabee during his time as Principal.

A fine dinner brought the two parallel groups back together, followed by a revival of the Cat's Ass pub.

### Grand Opening of the Jalynn Bennett Amphitheatre, Traill College

On an unseasonably hot day at the end of May, members of the Trent and Peterborough communities gathered for an arts and culture showcase to celebrate the opening of the new Jalynn Bennett Amphitheater at Traill College.

Jalynn Bennett studied at the University of Toronto with former president John Stubbs. She was a talented Canadian businesswoman who joined Trent's board in 1987, going on to chair it in 1994. Her estate gift of \$1.3 million along with support from the federal government Canadian Heritage department and the City of Peterborough enabled the construction of the new outdoor performance space. Jalynn Bennett's will exhorted the university to be 'audacious' in deploying her generous bestowal.

Traill College's location in downtown Peterborough opens the door for the Amphitheater to be a hub for music, theatre, culture and education in a unique setting.

Over a hundred people braved the baking sunshine aided by a well-stocked refreshment tent, seat cushions and loaner umbrellas. Once again, our retirees were well represented by David Morrison and Alena Heitlinger, former Traill leaders Heather Avery and James and Lynn Neufeld, Molly Blyth and Ian Storey. The Indigeneous performers Unity, who have performed the Honour Song at countless Convocations, presented Southern Oklahoma Sunny Song, which seemed apt given the weather. Unity includes four alumni including retirees Brenda Maracle O'Toole and Barb Rivett.

Dr. Michael Eamon, Principal of the college, oversaw the proceedings including a show-concluding rendition of Stand By Me.
